SMSC: Provides students with the opportunity to consider what it is like for people living in countries at varying levels of development, applying this to their own lives. Students look at real life issues (economic development in Nigeria, strategies to reduce development gaps, an empathetic approach to natural disasters and how they impact countries of differing levels of development.

Enrichment: students have the opportunity to attend a 3-day residential to Betws-y-coed and Criccieth in Wales, or a day visit to Hunstanton

British Values: students develop self-esteem and responsibility for their behaviour and well balanced opinions to explain their views. Students explore tolerance, mutual respect and individual liberty, cultures and religions and rule of law. Lessons look at how citizens of different countries around the world live and the opportunities and challenges that arise in these areas.
